School Improvement Day

On Monday the school was closed to the children but teachers were at work as this was one of our five improvement days this year. Our day was based in St Joseph's Catholic College in Swindon where we joined the other schools in the Samuel Partnership. The focus of the morning was to reflect on the year ahead and our partnership together. In the afternoon the St Joseph's staff looked at the school's Pupil Premium action plan and the RE Self Evaluation and action plan. Hopefully lots to look forward to.

We are also planning some exciting events in Term 4 which will include World Book Day and International and British Science Week. Even more to look forward to as the year progresses.

Is my child too ill for school?

As we now seem to be in a difficult Flu Season and this is a major area of coverage, it can be tricky deciding whether or not to keep your child off school when they're unwell. Guidance on this can be very confusing and very often children perk up once they arrive. Our rule of thumb would be that children should come to school unless they are visibly very unwell and distressed. We will always monitor them across the day and if they deteriorate we will contact you. NHS guidance does, however, specify a number of things that are currently very seasonal that give a clear guide to keeping your child off school. The most obvious, and one that seems to be going around at the moment is diarrhoea or vomiting. If this is the case they should stay away from school until they have not been sick or had diarrhoea for at least 2 days (48 hours).

There are other seasonal illnesses that may affect your child and the NHS help page has a very clear summary of these. There are government guidelines for schools and nurseries about health protection and managing specific infectious diseases at GOV.UK which is always our first port of call if we are unsure.

If you do keep your child at home, it's important to phone us and let us know that your child won't be in and give us a clear reason. As part of our absence management policy please also expect check in calls from us subsequent to this.




WOW moments across the school!
